News and Notes from Council

ST. JAMES LUTHERAN CHURCH CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING JULY 14, 2015 AT 6:00PM

DEVOTIONS GIVEN BY: Pastor Jim Rill

COUNCIL MINUTES: Minutes from June 9, 2015 were read, and corrections to the spelling from Alter to Altar were made. Evelyn Holsinger made a motion to accept. Donna Foster seconded the motion. The motion carried.

PASTORS' REPORT: Pastor Jim reported on having a good vacation and how nice it was to be around family.

Pastor Jim also commented on how successful the family picnic/worship turned out and commented on Pat McConnell's band being a real blessing.

Pastor Jim attended the Annual Conference of the National Association of Lutheran Intentional Interim Pastors on July $6^{th} - 14^{th}$. The conference focused on making changes within the church and helping interim pastors in accomplishing these goals.

On July 26th, 2015 Pastor Jim will be leading the service at the Lutheran Home in Hollidaysburg. The service will take place at 1:45pm with communion. All are invited to attend.

Pastor Jim distributed a handout on connecting with the students of PSU Altoona. Council approved the setup of a table at student orientation August 27th from 12-2 along with distribution of resources about St. James in an effort to invite students to become active in our ministries.

Pastor Jim suggested the idea of a council retreat. Council approved the idea and now will be looking into a date, location and agenda. Currently the consensus is late September.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Council members looked over the report and had no questions. Betty Boslet made a motion to accept. Donna Wilt seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Discussion took place on the distribution of WELCA gifts and to the needy. Mark explained that this does not come out of parish funds. There are two funds setup for these activities. First there is a Pastor's discretionary fund and second one for WELCA

FINANCE: Mark reported that he is still waiting to hear from Kooman Associates on the setup of a follow up meeting.

The audit forms still need to be signed. Tim will work with Ralph to either locate these forms or develop new ones.

We also need audit forms to be put into the church records.

A discussion ensued on the use of postage. It was finally agreed upon to stay the course because of the potential benefits.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION/SOCIAL MINISTRY: Our Pot Luck Dinner will be held Sunday July 19th, with the next one scheduled for August 16th. It was also brought up during this report the success of the family picnic. Pictures from the picnic will soon be posted to the church website. The Octoberfest committee will meet Sunday July 19th. Ideas and people are needed.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE: The AC has been installed. The bathroom on the first floor has been completed. The concrete work on the back steps is nearly complete, the front steps are still on the repair list. The down spouting on the front of the church has been repaired. The piping for drainage from the down spouting in the back near the office that was damaged due to freezing has been repaired. Line painting for the parking lot is still being looked into and should be completed soon. Water damage that was caused by the roof leak and mortar problems on the office side of the building has been repaired. Bill Dambeck is in the process of getting a quote on the repointing of the mortar on the office portion of the church facing Stevens Mortuary to prevent further damage to the building.

STEWARDSHIP/EVANGELISM COMMITEE: No report. They will meet in the fall.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC COMMITTEE: This committee is in need of a chairperson. Tim will be calling the committee to setup a meeting in August so they are ready for the fall.

MUTUAL MINISTRY COMMITTEE: A meeting will be scheduled by Pastor Jim for some time in August.

BY-LAWS COMMITTEE: Mark reported they need to schedule a committee meeting for the New Congregation Constitution. This meeting will take place this fall.

OLD BUSINESS: New Laptop for the office has been purchased and setup. The old computer will be reformatted and setup for the treasurer. Silk flowers for the Altar have been donated for the fall. The Bullying handout from the last meeting was brought up with a new handout created by Mark. Council decided this was a topic for the council retreat. A report was given on the Summer Music Camp. The mailing went over budget but with hopes of attracting more children. The Thursday night entertainment is in good shape. Currently 2 teachers are lined up but they still could use more. Signup for the camp is low but with hopes it will increase when Pastor Rill's wife Teri appears on Central PA Live July 27th between 4-5pm.

NEW BUSINESS: Pastor will be composing another letter to be sent out to the entire congregation encouraging them to return to worship. Mark will be purchasing a MP3 recorder to record sermons to be posted on our updated webpage. Thrivent will no longer be funding Needles for the Needy and the Quilting Group. A motion was made by Carolyn Feathers to donate \$250 to Needles for the Needy and seconded by Louisa Marshal. Motion carried. Council also decided to end the quilting program and donate the remaining materials to Bethany Lutheran Church.

WEBPAGE AND YOU-TUBE OF MUSIC: Tim will want pictures, Pastor's messages and choir music. It was also suggested to add pages for wedding and baptism arrangements along with hall rental. If we want to grow, sometimes this means changes!

COMMUNICATIONS: None

MEETING ADJOURNMENT: Evelyn Holsinger made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Donna Wilt seconded the motions. The motion carried. Council voted by standing. The Meeting adjourned at 8:15 PM with the Lord's Prayer.


There will be many opportunities to have fellowship with women from the Allegheny Synod. Come and be enlightened through the workshops, Bible study, and worship.



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace and peace to you in the name of the crucified and risen Christ.

Last week the U.S. Supreme Court rendered its decision announcing the right of same-gender couples to have equal access to marriage. For many members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, this decision is a welcome sign of hope and a time for celebration. Other members of this church do not agree with the court's decision and remain deeply concerned because of their understanding of Scripture.

This decision affects each of us, some profoundly, and we are not of one mind. Let us continue to accompany one another with prayer, love and mutual respect as we reflect on this new reality and remember Paul's words in 1 Corinthians about the enduring power of God's love. The ELCA social statement "Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust" (2009) neither endorses nor forbids samegender marriages and recognizes that we have differing understandings and convictions on this matter. In its decision, the court stated that "the First Amendment ensures that religious organizations and persons are given proper protection as they seek to teach the principles that are so fulfilling and so central to their lives and faiths."

According to this church's social statement on human sexuality, all decisions about recognizing, supporting and holding publicly accountable same-gender relationships are entrusted to congregations. Recognizing that the church is not of one mind on this subject, our 2009 actions provide that congregations and clergy should discern together whether to recognize such relationships and to what degree.

Pastors are to engage in conversation, discernment and partnership with the congregations who have called them prior to solemnizing or presiding over a same-gender marriage. On the other hand, no pastor is obligated to solemnize the marriage of any couple, same-gender or different-gender, whom the pastor cannot in good conscience marry.

As Lutheran Christians, we continue to be a church that engages in conversation and discernment in all aspects of our faith and life. Creating space for respectful conversation and dialogue continues to be an important part of our life together. A helpful resource for engaging in difficult conversations is "Talking Together as Christians about Tough Social Issues." In addition, the ELCA Ministry to and with Same-Gender Couples and their Families Working Group remains in the process of completing its work. A report of the group's findings and possible recommendations will be presented to the ELCA Church Council at its November meeting.

We seek to see our differences as a gift to be celebrated as we live out that which unites us: the mercy and grace of Jesus Christ who leads us into mission and ministry in the world. In the midst of this change, we are first and foremost church – a church that proclaims the good news of Jesus Christ. May God bless, guide and strengthen you each day as you go in peace and serve the Lord.

THE SANDWICH GENERATION

God created the first family and placed them in the Garden of Eden. And, throughout the Bible we see God caring for and nurturing families: Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah, Mary and Joseph.

Just as God cares for families, we are encouraged to do the same:

Ephesians 6:2-3-"Honor your father and mother that it may go well with you and that you may enjoy long life on the earth."

1 Timothy 5:4- "But if a widow has children or grandchildren, these should learn first of all to put their religion into practice by caring for their own family and so repaying their parents and grandparents, for this is pleasing to God."

But sometimes taking care of loved ones is even more challenging for adults who find themselves part of The Sandwich Generation-a term used to describe middle-aged adults who are caring for both young children and aging parents.

Nearly half of all American adults ages 40-59 have provided some financial support to an adult child in the past year. More than one quarter of sandwich-generation adults are the primary supporter of their adult child. And, one in five middle-aged adults has provided financial support to an aging parent in the past year.1

Financial support is just one of many ways we can look after our loved ones. Consider these other ways:

Spiritually-Pray for and with our family to seek God's guidance and blessing. Emotionally-Spend time with family to share in the joys and sorrows of life, within the bond of family love.

Practically-Recognize what family members need and take action to provide for those needs.

Family is one of God's greatest blessings. Nurturing and caring for our families is an even greater blessing-to us and to them.

The **Albert Mann Scholarship Fund** income for the year, is divided equally among all the applicants.







- 1. Place one or two activated glow sticks in each bottle. Fill bottles with water and decorate with star stickers, if desired. Screw on lids.
- 2. Put some glow sticks inside the hamster ball. Screw the halves together, and secure sides and lid with tape.
- 3. Challenge someone to a game of bowling. For the best glowing effect, play after dark.
